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INTRODUCTION

ALLAN ANGOFF: Good morning, ladies and gentlemen. For the officers and trustees, I am glad to open this 24th Annual International Conference of the Parapsychology Foundation. Our theme is "Education in Parapsychology," and it is a theme that represents a culmination of the Foundation's objectives.
